KICKOFF EVENT IS AUGUST 26

Thursday, August 26, at 7:00 p.m.

This event is hosted by the Glencoe Public Library but will take place on the second floor of Writers' Theatre, 325 Tudor Court, Glencoe.

For this year's program series, Writers' Theatre will stage the musical "She Loves Me," a romantic comedy with music by Jerry Bock and Sheldon Harnick, who also collaborated on "Fiddler on the Roof." The book was written by Joe Masterhoff, who is best known for writing the book for "Cabaret." The play will open on September 14, 2010.

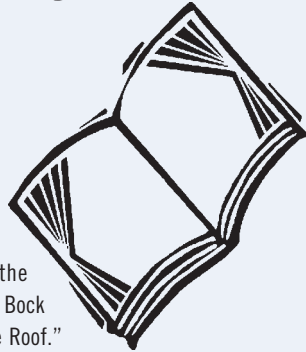
THE SURVEY RESULTS ARE IN

We asked what you think about the library and its services, and you told us! Thank you to all 515 respondents to the library's survey, which was conducted March 15-28. Library officials were very pleased with the volume of responses as well as the information presented by participants, who were overwhelmingly Glencoe residents.

Virtually all (98.8%) of survey respondents have library cards and nearly 60% visit the library several times a month. A third (34%) also uses the library's website via the Internet.

Based on information learned through the survey, library staff will plan promotions and additional training in areas of greatest interest: use of library databases, benefits of signing up for email to receive updates on materials checked out and notification of library activities; and training in downloading audio and video content from library vendors.

Results from the survey and a planning retreat that took place on April 17 are being incorporated into the new **Strategic Plan 2010-2013**. The plan will be available to the public early this summer.

INTRODUCING MY MEDIA MALL

We are now members of My Media Mall, a consortium of libraries offering access to downloadable books and audiobooks. These materials are available 24/7 for you to download to your home computer, laptop, iPod, iPhone, iPad, Android, or Blackberry. There is no worry about late fees because items are automatically checked back in at the end of the loan period. MOVIES ON THE GREEN ARE BACK

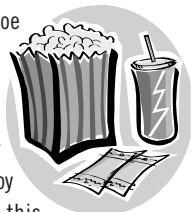

If you're an audiobook listener or are interested in ebooks that you can read on the Sony Reader and other popular ebook ereaders, then you'll want to come see the demonstration of our brand-new **My Media Mall database**. My Media Mall lets you download audiobooks and ebooks to various devices including computers, mp3 players, and phones. 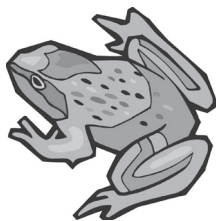

The children's department offers TWO collections of books specially packaged for reading in a group – as a family or with friends.

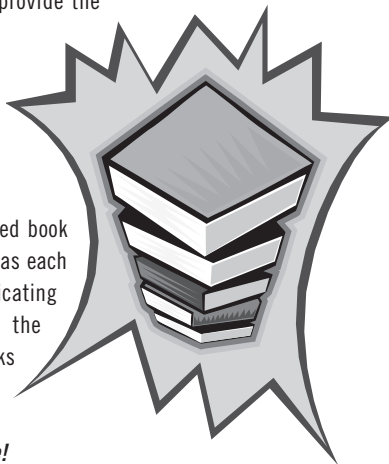

These books and discussions are designed for families with children in a range of ages from **preK through 5th grade**.



Each **Do-It-Yourself Book Club** pamphlet includes questions and information on one of the titles featured at the library's Friday night *Read Outside the Library* book discussion. 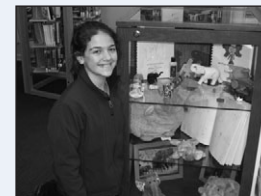

CRAZY HEART

Monday, June 21, at 1:00 & 7:00 p.m.

111 minutes. Rated R.

Jeff Bridges won the 2010 Best Actor Academy Award for his portrayal of struggling country musician Bad Blake. The film begins as the aging Blake is playing a series of one-night gigs to small crowds. While performing in Santa Fe, he meets a young journalist, Jean (Maggie Gyllenhaal). The two strike up an unlikely romance. The relationship, along with a call to open for a major country star, would seem to offer a chance at redemption for the singer. But he's not called Bad without reason. Will he sabotage his life and career again, or find some success and peace of mind? "It's one of the year's best, most deeply felt films." — Kyle Smith, *New York Post*.

THE MESSENGER

In his first leading role, Ben Foster stars as Will Montgomery, a U.S. Army officer who has just returned home from a tour in Iraq and is assigned to the Army's Casualty Notification service. He is partnered with fellow officer Tony Stone (Woody Harrelson) to bear the bad news to the loved ones of fallen soldiers. Despite the serious subject matter, the film reveals itself as a surprising, humorous, moving and very human portrait of grief, friendship and survival. "Despite the grim subject, it's a sweet-tempered movie, with moments of explosive humor — an entertainment." — David Denby, *The New Yorker*.

THE ART OF THE STEAL

101 minutes. Not rated.

Albert C. Barnes used his considerable fortune to amass one of the world's most remarkable private art collections, featuring original paintings by Van Gogh, Renoir, Picasso, Cézanne, and many other important artists. No friend of the Philadelphia elite, Barnes mandated in his will that his collection was never to be removed from its suburban gallery. But decades after his death, his will is circumvented by some of the very cultural and political figures that Barnes so despised, as they seem to have won the battle to move his priceless collection to downtown Philadelphia. "...an intellectual crime thriller, uncovering each new surprise — and a seemingly endless parade of villains — with a deadpan flourish." — Elizabeth Weitzman, *New York Daily News*.
