Now you can read full digital copies of your favorite magazines on your computer, tablet, or phone! You'll get all of the material that's in the print edition as well as additional features such as video, audio, even live links in some issues. Magazine issues are not checked out, so they're always available to read online or to download for reading offline. Come to the Technology Tuesday program on Tuesday, June 17, to learn all about using Zinio, or stop at the Reference Desk for help getting started.



Enterprise – Your New Online Catalog

This August we will introduce you to Enterprise, our new online catalog. It looks a lot like the catalog you use now, but it has some differences that we think you will like.

Enterprise is very mobile-friendly, so it will be easy to use on your tablet or phone. Ebooks and other digital materials will be integrated more easily into the catalog. Enterprise is updated frequently, providing more accurate information about whether an item is checked out or on the shelf. If you like to keep booklists in your account, you'll still be able to do that. And finally, Enterprise will be less expensive for the library to purchase and maintain.

Detailed instructions about searching, placing holds and using the "My Account" feature will be available when we launch Enterprise. The transition to the new catalog should be a relatively easy one for us all.




TIM'S VERMEER




FINDING VIVIAN MAIER
